School Policy

A learning environment exists in which everyone feels safe.

- Every person in the school community is protected from harm.
- All staff and volunteers are provided with guidance to help them recognise the signs of abuse.
- All staff and volunteers working in the school have clear guidance on the action which is required where abuse of a child is suspected.
- Effective structures and procedures exist in support of the child where a suspicion of child abuse has been reported.
- Every concern about the welfare of children in this school will be followed up by staff.

What is child abuse?

ABUSE can take any of the following forms:



Neglect: the persistent or significant neglect of a child, or the failure to protect a child from exposure to any kind of danger, including cold or starvation, or persistent failure to carry out important aspects of care, resulting in significant impairment of the child's health or development.

<u>Physical:</u> physical injury to a child, whether deliberately inflicted or knowingly not prevented.

<u>Sexual</u>: the sexual exploitation of a child or young person for an adult's or another young person's own sexual gratification; the involvement of children or young people in sexual activities of any kind (including exposure to pornography) which they do not understand, to which they are unable to give informed consent or that violate normal family roles.

<u>Emotional</u>: persistent or significant emotional ill treatment or rejection, resulting in severe adverse effects on the emotional, physical and/or behavioural development of a child.

<u>Exploitation</u>: is the intentional ill-treatment, manipulation or abuse of power and control over a child or young person, to take selfish or unfair advantage of a child or young person or situation for personal gain.

Procedure for reporting suspected (or disclosed) child abuse

If, at any time, a child makes a disclosure to a member of staff that gives rise to concerns about possible abuse, or if a member of staff has concerns about a child, the member of staff will act immediately, and the following process will be applied:

- He/she will speak to Mrs McCracken (Designated Teacher) or the Deputy Designated Teachers—Mr McBride, Mr Smith, Mr McClelland or Mr Carlisle.
- Mrs McCracken, Mr McBride, Mr Smith, Mr McClelland or Mr Carlisle will discuss any concerns with Mrs Montgomery.
- If appropriate, a referral will be made immediately to Social Services.
